

Joshua Krane is a nationally and internationally recognized leader in competition / antitrust and foreign investment matters. Considered a leader in advertising law, Joshua has also been at the forefront of new developments as advertising has become increasingly digital. As the former co-author of Investment Canada Act: Commentary and Annotation, Joshua is frequently called upon to advise on foreign investment matters, including national security reviews. He has testified several times before the House of Commons standing committee on Industry and Technology regarding the Investment Canada Act.

Earlier in his career, Joshua worked for several government agencies, including the legal services branch of the Competition Bureau, the constitutional law branch of the Ministry of the Attorney General of Ontario, and the Federal Prosecution Service.
